An Easter Story

I was ordained on December the 13th 2003, The Feast Day of St. Lucy. It was a Saturday, and on the following Sunday, I served my first and last Sunday service at my home church St. Dunstan's. Monday morning I reported at my new assigned church, Christ the King, and to my new priest, The Rev. Glenn Kanestrom. Brand new deacon at a church I'd never seen before, reporting to my new priest that I had met just once at my ordination. The rest of December went better than I could have hoped for. I felt welcome and needed by January, and by February, Paige felt comfortable as well. Before I knew it, Lent was upon us, and Holy Week. As part of Holy Week, Rev. Glenn scheduled a reading of The Stations of the Cross. To my dismay, it was poorly attended, but even with just the few who were there I believe we felt very moved by this Holy experience. Among the "few" was a young mother named Patti, along with her two school-aged children. The children to my surprise, had remained attentive and quiet throughout the entire service; but now they needed to run off some of their pent up energy, and so asked their mom if they could go out on the lawn and play. Rev. Glenn, in the mean time, had gone back to his office, leaving Patti, her children, and me to get to know each other. Patti and I sat at one of the round tables in our multi-purpose narthex, which served as coffee hour room, classroom, Cookie Walk room, Alanon meeting room, and as I would soon find out, Fat Tuesday Pancake dining hall. There was also

perhaps the most meaningful use of the narthex. Once a month, it would be filled with chairs to be used by the poor and needy of Riverbank as they waited to receive the brown bags of food we provided through our Food In Faith program. As Patti and I sat watching her children through the glass doors of the narthex, she turned to me and asked, "Deacon, when does the Resurrection really happen, when does Easter really begin?" I thought for a moment and then I remembered my former priest's much used answer, "It's in the book," meaning The Book of Common Prayer. "Just a minute," I answered, as I ran to the sanctuary to get two Books of Common Prayer. When I returned, I handed one of the books to Patti, and asked her to turn to page 285, The Great Vigil of Easter. Together we read the opening salutation, the rubrics for the lighting of the new fire, and from that fire, the lighting of the Paschal Candle. I then read to her a few lines from the Exsultet:

"This is the night, when all who believe in Christ are delivered from the gloom of sin, and are restored to grace and holiness of life. This is the night, when Christ broke the bonds if death and hell, and rose victorious from the grave."

Patti looked at me and said, "Why don't they teach us that?" Lost for words, I simply said I don't know, why not ask our priest? I'm not sure exactly what Patti said to our priest, but the next thing I knew I was called to his office and informed that it was too late to plan for The Great Vigil of Easter this year, but we would prepare and celebrate it next Easter.

That "next year's" Easter was planned for far in advance of it's coming. Jane, Rev. Glenn's wife, was also the choir director. Jane chose the music to be used from the list provided in the Vigil rubrics; she also helped find readers for the passages of scripture that would be read throughout the service. Rev. Glenn assigned me the task of providing the "new fire" of Easter. The initial problem was what kind of container might I use that would not scorch our lawn. Someone came up with the idea to use a portable barbeque. After some prayerful thought, I rejected the suggestion; it just didn't seem fitting, at least to me, that the "new fire of Easter" would come from a device we use to cook steaks and burgers. My choice was a galvanized multi-purpose tub like the one my Grannie had in my childhood. It was about

three feet around and one foot tall. Paige and I found one at a farm supply store in Oakdale. It worked beautifully that Easter, and a few Easter's since then; you see, this vessel was made to last, so it made the trip from Christ the King to St. Paul's with the people who would also become a part of St. Paul's.

It seems as if the years have flown by since coming to St. Paul's. When I first came to Christ the King, I was sixty-six years old, I was about seventyeight when I came to St. Paul's, and somehow now I'm eighty-six. One Easter Vigil a few years ago, Bishop David came to St. Paul's to celebrate this night of nights. As usual, I had the fire started minutes before the Bishop began the service. The Pashcal Candle was handed to me just as the bishop walked toward me with a taper lighted from the Easter Fire. I don't know how the Bishop knew that I was concerned about my ability to carry the heavy candle from the narthex to the altar, but something made him ask me if I was sure that he shouldn't have an altar server carry the candle before me in the procession. I answered," I really want to do it, if I possibly can." I felt the weight of the Paschal Candle as the Bishop put the taper to the wick. Bishop then gave the opening address, the opening prayer, and the slow procession to the altar in the darkened church began. We processed about a third of the way to the altar, then we stopped and I sang, "The light of Christ" and the people answered, "Thanks be to God." The two servers just behind me lit the handheld candles of those on the aisles, and they in turn lit those next to them, and so on. Another third of the way down, and I sang the words at the top of my vocal range. After the servers lit the final candles, I placed the Paschal Candle in the candle stand. I had made it to the altar. The Lord had given me the strength; and then the tears came, tears of sadness, because I knew this would be the last time I would be able to do this, and those tears were tempered by tears of joy; joy because I had been blessed by being allowed to bring the Light of Christ into the church sanctuary I love and to the people whom God loves.




Sharing the Load

In 1969 the Hollies released "He Ain't Heavy, He's My Brother." Do you know the story behind that song title?

Fifty years earlier in Omaha, Nebraska, a boy with polio was abandoned at Father Flanagan's Home for Boys, predecessor to the Boys Town organization. Soon several older residents started carrying young Howard — with his heavy leg braces — especially up stairs. Father Flanagan once saw an older boy, Reuben, doing this and asked if it was hard work. Reuben replied, "He ain't heavy, Father. He's my brother." Years later, these words and the image of one person carrying another became the Boys Town brand.

All of us have been "carried" at some point, and we've likely "carried" someone else. The Hollies' song declares: "His welfare is my concern." Jesus said it this way: "Love your neighbor as yourself." The load isn't too heavy to bear because Jesus himself is always carrying us.

BINGO Game Night


The first (maybe annual.....maybe.....) Bingo game was enjoyed by twenty-two lucky people, Friday, March 24th.

Admission was free with canned goods for Interfaith Ministries. Once again, the people of St. Paul's showed their generosity with 4 big bags and boxes of non-


perishable items to help stock the shelves at Interfaith Ministries.

Recipe from BINGO Night

If you were at BINGO Night and were lucky enough to pick up one (or more) of Linda's DELICIOUS Fruit Preserve bars, maybe you were thinking the same thing as me, and that would be, "I want that recipe!"

Linda was kind enough to send it to me and here it is for all of you.

Fruit Preserves Almond Squares

Base:

1 box yellow cake mix with pudding included

½ cup butter, melted

½ cup finely chopped almonds

Middle: 1 cup fruit preserves (apricot, blackberry, or other)

Filling:

8 oz. cream cheese, softened

1/4 cup sugar

2 tablespoons flour

1/8 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1 egg

1/3 cup fruit preserves

½ cup flaked coconut

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees, generously grease a 9x13 baking pan.
- 2. Combine cake mix and butter at low speed until crumbly. Stir in chopped almonds. Reserve 1 cup mixture for filling.
- 3. Press remaining base mixture in bottom of prepared pan.
- 4. Carefully spread 1 cup preserves over base.
- 5. In the same bowl, beat cream cheese, sugar, flour, salt, vanilla and egg until well mixed. Blend in 1/3 cup preserves at low speed. Carefully spread filling mixture over base.
- 6. Combine reserved base mixture and coconut. Sprinkle over filling.
- 7. Bake for 30-40 minutes until golden brown and set in the center.

Cool completely and refrigerate. Cut into bars after a few hours.

Good news flags

Use batik, a unique fabric-dying method, to create flags celebrating the good news of Christ's resurrection.



What you need:

- · Colored chalk
- White linen fabric
- Washable gel glue
- Acrylic craft paint
- Textile medium
- · Paintbrushes

What you do:

- 1. Cut fabric to the desired size and shape. Set it on a flat, protected surface. With chalk, lightly sketch an Easter design or message.
- 2. Completely cover the chalk lines with gel glue. Let dry.
- Mix equal parts paint and textile medium. Paint the flag with that mixture, which makes paint permanent. Let dry.
- Soak the dried fabric in warm water a few minutes. Then gently peel away the glue to reveal the unpainted areas. Lay flat to dry.
- 5. Hang the flags and celebrate!
