Peace Pilgrim

He said to them, 'The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into his harvest. Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals.' – Luke 10:2-4

I'm sure this is a very familiar passage to all of us, a passage of giving us the words of Jesus as he sends forth the first of his disciples. I don't know how these few words affect you, or what images they evoke in your mind; for me, until recently, it drew pictures we've all seen in Hollywood biblical films. You know the scenes I'm talking about: heaven-bound men on their knees looking up at their Messiah with a look of love and complete surrender. How could this be true? How could this have really happened? No money, no extra clothes, not even an extra pair of shoes for perhaps a long journey. Biblical times must have been different, people must have been different. Remember I did say, "until recently."

For two years Paige and I have been reading and praying with a book of daily meditations for spiritual growth called, "You Are The Beloved" which is compiled from writings of Henri J. Nouwen. Since my early days in seminary, I have made it a practice to read footnotes, endnotes, and bibliographies in order to find additional information in my studies. Somehow in the first year of reading the meditations, I had missed the footnote on page 348, November 14. This second time, as we read and prayed, the footnote caught my eye. The meditation is titled, "Inner Peace and Social Action." The footnote simply read *Peace Pilgrim (1908-1981), born Mildred Lisette Norman, was an American nondenominational spiritual teacher, mystic, pacifist, and peace activist. In the meditation Nouwen writes, "Peace Pilgrim helped me see how important inner peace is. It is that sense of God's presence in our lives that allows us to trust in the power of God's peace, even when we do little." A little further in the meditation, Nouwen gives us this insight into the meaning of God's peace, "Be sure to make this inner peace your utmost priority. When we radiate the peace of Christ we are peacemakers, and then our peace action can witness to this inner peace. But without that inner peace, our actions easily become instruments of the power of war and destruction."

Rereading that footnote, a series of questions pressed in on me. Who was this Peace Pilgrim? How had her life, work, and actions drawn the attention of such a great monk and prolific author? I had to know more about this Peace Pilgrim and why I had never heard of her before this footnote. How had she lived her life in search of God's inner peace?

I began my search on the internet, where I found a brief biography. In the biography I found that friends of Peace Pilgrim had taken a thirty-page booklet she had written and published it as a book simply titled, "Peace Pilgrim." Her life and works in her own words. Of course I had to have that book. I found a hardbound copy in Amazon's used books. In a few days I received my copy of what would become a treasure to me. This small book (only 208 pages) came with its dustcover still intact. On the front of the cover was a picture of Peace Pilgrim: white, medium-length hair, a weathered smiling face, and wearing her only possessions, a blue tunic with pockets to hold a few personal items. Pilgrim also wore matching blue slacks and canvas shoes. On the front of the tunic in big white letters was her chosen name, Peace Pilgrim. I would learn as I read her book that on the back of her tunic, also in white letters, was this message, "Twenty-Five Thousand Miles on Foot for Peace." Yes, 25,000 miles, Pilgrim crossed America for nearly three decades. As she journeyed and prayed, her message was always the same, "I shall remain a wanderer until mankind has learned the way of peace. Overcome evil with good, and falsehood with truth, and hatred with love."

Pilgrim walked until she was given shelter and fasted until she was given food. Pilgrim spoke to people along the way. She spoke to gatherings, church groups, college groups. She presented her message through newspapers, radio and television.

"See I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves/ Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals." – Luke 10

In reading this book about Peace Pilgrim I am beginning to grasp her understanding of peace. Pilgrim is speaking of inner peace without which there can never be peace in the world. She is speaking of the peace we find written about in Philippians 4:7 "And the peace of God which surpasses all understanding will guard our hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." It is the peace that is implied in the Lord's Prayer. "Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in Heaven." It is the peace of the kingdom within us. It is "the peace of the Lord be always with you... and also with you."

I pray I have given you enough information about Peace Pilgrim that you might find your way to that inner peace, so that the love of our Lord might shine through you. I would like to close with this message from Peace Pilgrim:

"In my dealings with people, I don't chastise, nor do I issue edicts or lay down a blueprint. My appointed work is to awaken the divine nature that is within. This is my calling, to open doors of truth and make people think, to arouse others from their apathetic and lethargic state, and get them to seek out for themselves the inner peace which dwells within. This is the extent of my undertaking, I can do no more. The rest I leave to a higher power.

May the peace of the Lord be always with you.

CROSS OF ASHES — On Ash Wednesday, as Lent begins, worshipers' foreheads are often marked with ashes in the sign of the cross. The ashes traditionally come from burning palm branches from the previous Palm Sunday. In the Old Testament, ashes were a sign of mourning and repentance. Today, some worshipers wipe off the ashes before leaving church, to symbolize being cleansed from sin by Jesus' death; others wear the ashes the rest of the day, carrying the cross of Christ into the world. Reciting Genesis 3:19 often accompanies the placement of ashes: "You are dust, and to dust you shall return."

Spring Training for Christians

The word Lent comes from Middle English and German words for springtime. In light of the start of baseball season, some people call the pre-Easter season "spring training for Christians." This fresh perspective moves away from the flawed understanding that Lent must be somber, or that giving something up for Lent is punishment for sin or a way to earn God's favor.

As people of faith, we should never take a season off. But every so often at least once a year! — we do well to examine where we need to get back in shape spiritually. Perhaps we will indeed opt to give something up: that swearing habit, sleeping in on Sundays, or the cost of a weekly treat so we can donate the money instead. Or maybe we'll take on something new for Lent: a Bible study, prayer routine or service project.

Hebrews describes spiritual discipline as challenging in the moment but yielding righteousness later. The writer urges us, "Lift your drooping hands and strengthen your weak knees ... so that what is lame may not be put out of joint but rather be healed" (12:11-13, ESV). May the spring training of Lent strengthen and heal us all.

What you need:

- Yarn
- Scissors
- Parchment paper
- Baking sheet
- Heart-shaped cookie cutters
- ¼ cup cornstarch
- ½ cup water
- Adult help



What you do:

- 1. Cut yarn into 12-inch pieces.
- 2. Place cookie cutters atop a baking sheet lined with parchment paper.
- 3. Combine cornstarch and water in a saucepan. Heat mixture over medium heat, stirring until thick and smooth. Remove from heat and cool to form a "glue."
- 4. Dip each piece of yarn into the mixture to coat completely. Squeeze off any excess.
- 5. Place yarn in the cookie cutters, allowing pieces to cross and loop within the heart. Add more until the cookie cutter is filled and the yarn looks like a heart.
- 6. Remove cookie cutters and bake the sheet for two hours at 150°F, or until hearts are dry and hard.
