Revival, Tradition and Meatballs

In my last article I wrote about what it might mean to have a revival in the Episcopal Church starting here at Saint Paul's and beginning with our book of Common Prayer. I began the article by giving some of the definitions of the word revival:

- 1. Restoration to life, consciousness, vigor, strength, etc.
- 2. The revival of old customs.
- 3. An awakening in church or community, of interest in and care for matters relating to personal religion.
- 4. An evangelistic service or a series of services for the purpose of effecting a religious awakening.
- 5. The state of being revived.

I would like to add to this list the definition of the word tradition:

- 1. The transmission of customs or beliefs from generation to generation, or the fact of being passed on in this way.
- 2. A doctrine believed to have divine authority though not in the scriptures.

I ended the article sharing my prayer that you might read these definitions a few times, perhaps taking notes and then writing your thoughts of how revival might bring new life and vigor to Saint Paul's, our diocese, and each of our lives.

We now have the definition of revival and tradition, but what about the meatballs? It may sound strange to you, but to me, meatballs, and the sauce my mom made are both a revival and a tradition.

Halloween is upon us along with the thoughts of Thanksgiving. Growing up, Thanksgiving always meant a Greyhound bus trip to San Francisco and Aunt Bessie and Uncle Red's house where we would be joined by twenty or so family members; an extended family all bringing special ethnic side dishes to complement Aunt Bessie's turkey. My mom was always expected, without fail, to bring meatballs and sauce to the gathering (Great grandma's Italian recipe). Mom made everything from scratch, which would take her a good part of a day. Over the years, Mom taught me the recipe. I in turn have shown my children in the same way, no shortcuts, no food processors, no microwave. Instead, we use olive-oiled wooden chopping bowl and a half-moonshaped chopping blade with a wooden handle; an old-fashioned cast iron skillet; and no metal spoons, wood only. This tradition is a way to keep our family connected to the warmth and love of those of our ancestors that have gone before us. Reading my "meatball" story, you might think, "times change, we now have food processors, we have microwave ovens, everybody uses metal spoons. What's your problem? Why not make it easy on yourself? Cooking should be userfriendly." I guess my answer might be to ask what is gained and what is lost. Perhaps it's just me, but "user-friendly" is starting to grate on my nerves like the drip, drip, drip of a leaky faucet. This term, user-friendly, might be ignored by me but for the fact that it is being pushed forward as a way for the Episcopal Church to attract more people.

What would be gained and what would be lost? Who and what would we be without our traditions? Covid has caused us to lose touch with some of our traditions, but other traditions are being forgotten simply because we no longer observe them. Of primary concern to me is our lack of use of the Book of Common Prayer, which has almost been replaced by a bulletin, except for special occasions. When was the last time we used our prayer book? How many of us have a prayer book at home? Do we ever use it at home as a family? The Book of Common Prayer, giving English-speaking people their first look at the scripture written in their language, was presented to them in 1549; this was 61 years before the first publishing of the King James Bible, in 1611. We might well look at our Book of Common Prayer as a workbook to help us understand and bring us the meaning of living in the Light of Our Lord.

My prayer is that we as sisters and brothers in Christ, led by our priest, may sit down together and rediscover the wisdom and traditions of our prayer book, so that we once again may celebrate walking in the "Middle Way" between Catholicism and Protestantism; that we may re-learn the way of Episcopal ideology, the three-legged stool of Scripture, Tradition, and Reason, and once again celebrate Holy Eucharist with the ringing of the Sanctus Bells saying "Holy, Holy, Lord God of power and might, Heaven and Earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord Hosanna in the highest."

Information gathered at the sessions, and previously in the diocesan-wide survey, may be used by the search committee to help discern qualities they are looking for in a bishop as they prepare to accept nominations and evaluate candidates, and may also be incorporated in the diocesan profile shared with the prospective nominees.



Why I Work on Mental Health Projects in Ukraine.

I have had a couple of people at St. Paul ask me why I am involved with projects in Ukraine, and I enjoy this question because it allows me a chance to explain my understanding of the book of James in the New Testament.

James was an important book in the Bible for me when I was young because it helped me understand the balance between action and belief. I had known many Christians for whom their faith focused on belief, with a desire on having "right" beliefs. But in my life when I pursued a deeper belief in Christ, I had a strange empty feeling until I understood that in the early church belief was only true belief if it motivated one to action. Action as an agent for Christ. As James says,

In the same way, faith by itself if it is not accompanied by action, is dead. But someone will say, "You have faith; I have deeds." Show me your faith without deeds, and I will show you my faith by my deeds. ¹⁹ You believe that there is one God. Good! Even the demons believe that—and shudder.

In February 2022, I saw videos of Russian troops invading Ukraine. In one of the videos, I saw a hospital that had been hit by a missile with some patients dead outside. I knew enough psychiatry to know that attacks like this would have

profound impact on mentally ill persons in Ukraine, and that many persons who were vulnerable to mental illness would become symptomatic when exposed to the stress of war. My desire to become involved had nothing to do with politics, but as a response to the obvious suffering of civilians who had no ability to protect themselves from the damage caused by war.

Seeing those in need, I next tried to get accurate information about what was going on with schizophrenia care in Ukraine and with the lives of those with schizophrenia or those who worked with people who had schizophrenia. But it was very difficult for me to get any accurate and detailed information. So next I started looking at the war and how it was impacting different areas within Ukraine to see if there was a way I could go there and see for myself what was going on in the area of schizophrenia care. Why schizophrenia care? Because this is the area within the larger world of mental health where I have the most expertise. I believe that God empowers us with certain skills and those are the particular skills He expects us to use in the world. If I had been an electrician, then I would have wondered how the war has impacted the electrical system. If I was a lawyer, then I would be interested in war crimes and how the war had impacted their legal system. If I was a surgeon, then I might volunteer in a hospital to do emergency surgeries. But since my skills are with people who have schizophrenia, then that is where I may be useful. Since I couldn't get good information, I convinced a friend to go with me and in April 2023 we entered Ukraine for the first time.

The purpose of the first trip is simply to make initial contacts and to get some basic information on safety and travel. I found a YouTube video by someone who appeared to be from Lviv, Ukraine so I sent them an email and asked if they could introduce me to a psychiatrist in Lviv. They gave me some good advice on how to get into the country and found a psychiatrist who would meet with me. I met with that doctor and after our meeting he had me come back and give a lecture the next day on schizophrenia care in California for his entire medical team. That meeting produced many contacts and an opportunity to talk to several people about the situation in Lviv. The next day I rented a car and drove over several days to multiple towns in the Lviv Oblast to meet others and see what I could find about the war, safety of travel in different areas, and to learn more about the structure of their mental health system.

Once we came back from Ukraine, I began to email multiple people I had met and started discussing what would be useful for them on my next trip. I communicated my desire to visit other psychiatric hospitals and meet other doctors. My second trip was in December 2023 and at that time I visited a larger psychiatric hospital and met many more doctors. I also met with people associated with Krisenchat Ukraine that provides services to persons who do not have access to traditional mental health services. I gave a lecture on psychopharmacology at a large hospital in Lviv and again expanded my network of connections. At this meeting we decided that in 2024 they wanted a bigger educational workshop that would incorporate more scientific content.

When I came back from that second trip, I began looking for two of the best

psychiatric educators in the US and Canada. It took a long time for me to find a way to get in touch with them, but God opened a door for me to meet with one of them and discuss face to face about the idea of a full afternoon workshop in Ukraine. This doctor was very excited about the opportunity to speak in Ukraine using Zoom and we started working on the details of setting up the workshop. This turned into a very big project involving many helpers in Ukraine and many tasks that had to be completed here in the US to make this workshop possible. I really felt God leading me in this work and details seemed to fall together. I was under a lot of stress related to this project in July and August, but when the afternoon came on September 10 in Lviv, it all paid off with a very successful training that was well attended and

was on subject material that the Ukrainian doctors had specifically requested. Each of the critical areas such as translation of slides, translation of speech, Zoom video, room location and safety all came together.

After the sessions, some doctors needed to quickly leave, but more than 50 people remained and we discussed why I had come to Ukraine in the first place and why I had used my own money to help people who had been strangers to me just 18 month earlier. As I explained that they mattered to me because they mattered to God and I was following God's call in my life by coming to Ukraine, some people cried (which of course made me cry). I explained that as a Christian I believed all money was actually God's money and we on Earth are just temporary stewards of that money. I explained that it seemed to my wife and I that God had given us more than we needed so we were compelled to use some of our money to do work

for others. It gave me a rare opportunity to express verbally a love for those in need that communicated a core Christian belief in the value of every person. "For God so loved the world …" He loved the whole world, and not just people we know.

The next phase of helping doctors in Ukraine is to bring 4 psychiatrists to the US in November to participate in a national psychopharmacology congress in Colorado.

During the 9 days these doctors are in the US they will get to visit multiple hospitals and meet many different doctors who are working with similar types of patients here in the US. It will provide them not just information, but an expanded network of other professionals they can interact with in the years ahead. We at St. Paul's have an opportunity to contribute to these doctors both by helping cover the cost of their coming here for training, but also by welcoming them into our community and into our homes on November 11. Based on conversations I have had with each of these 4 doctors, I don't believe they share our belief in Christ, but this gives us a unique opportunity to share the message of the gospel to them not just in words but through the tangible expression of assistance in their work helping the mentally ill in Ukraine. I have been surprised in conversations I have had with doctors in Ukraine how many of them just assume that since I am a scientist, I must be an atheist. I commented to one doctor that with all he knew about the complexity of the human brain, I was surprised he didn't believe that there must be a God who made it.

Never let the fear of death keep you from serving others. There is nothing more

certain in each of our lives than the fact you will die. What is not certain is to what extent you will surrender yourself to be used as a tool in God's hand while you are still alive. Running from death makes us run from those who need us the most. Be instead like the firefighter who runs toward the smell of smoke, or the police officer that runs toward the sound of gunfire. When you run toward the sound of people suffering, you will find that Christ has gotten there before you and is ready for you to join in the work.

I know very little about war and politics and all such things. But I know that helping the victims of war is a Christian service. Empowering those who provide care to the victims of war is a Christian service. Following the way of Christ means reaching out to those in need even when it is difficult, dangerous, or may cause us to lose money or time. Please pray for those who provide aid to the victims of war throughout the world. Join with me as we seek to serve others whom Christ died to save using whatever skills and resources, He has given you to use.




Figure 1: Visual Representation of Treasurer's Report for August

Come, Walk With Us

A word about stewardship from Fr Brian.

Thirty years ago, I was the Managing Director of a not-for-profit Christian broadcasting organisation. Our mission was to provide faith-based content for commercial, "secular" radio stations which was challenging in many ways, not least financially. When I was appointed to the position the Board asked me to name my salary, noting that it could be as much as I liked but I would have to raise every cent of it as part of the job. As a professional broadcaster I was focused on producing top quality radio, but I learned quickly that I could only do that if I had the required resources, which meant that for part of the time at least I was also a professional fundraiser.

I mention this story by way of introduction to our annual Parish Stewardship Campaign. As rector I know that part of my role is to support the vestry in ensuring we have enough resources to keep our church doors open and our wheels of ministry turning. Sometimes this can feel like being a professional fundraiser again, but the thing I eventually learned thirty years ago was that for most of those giving us their money it wasn't about the funds. For those faithful many who donated to Christian Broadcasting Association this was their way of participating with us in the mission of the organisation. They believed in what we were doing and wanted to be a part of that.

As noted elsewhere in this edition of *The Epistle*, this year's Stewardship Campaign has the theme 'Walk in Love'. While there will certainly be discussion of sharing our time, talents and treasures, the overwhelming invitation will be to come and walk with us. Our mission, our raison d'étre if you will, is to be the local and outward expression of God's love in Modesto. To do that we need workers and money, but most of all we need presence. We need people walking together as the visible evidence of our purpose and commitment.

To be clear again, yes, we need money. That is an ever-present reality of course and for those who can afford it your commitment in terms of financial support will be a vital way to join in our mission.
